Cover Illustration: "The Cadet Money of all Mennonite Congregations in East and West Prussia and Lithuania by acreage and membership over fifteen years of age. Assembled on August 6, 1840, at the widow Mrs. Wall in Marienburg." This document summarizes the payment obligations in 1840 of congregations in the Prussian provinces of East and West Prussia (excluding Danzig) toward the annual 5,000 Reichtaler tax that Mennonites paid collectively from 1773 to 1867 to the Prussian state in exchange for exemption from military service. Each congregation raised its designated amount based a set fee per male and female congregant over the age of fifteen as well as a tax on the farmland members owned.
