- Linda Arthur Bradley is Professor Emeritus at Washington State University where she specialized in studies of clothing and textiles as related to gender, ethnicity and religion. Her recent co-authored publication (2016) on issues of exercise dress for plus sized women in *Fashion and Textiles* won an international award in 2017 for best Social Science paper published in the previous year.
