In 1903 Kornelius Hildebrandt transferred the management to his children and son-in-law Priess. The factory consisted of two branches, one located in the Chortitza colony and the other, established in 1892, in Schoenwiese (Alexandrovsk). At the beginning of World War I the Chortitza branch employed 80 workers, and the Schoenwiese branch 100, with an annual output value at 500,000 rubles (Menn. Encyclopedia II, 741).
